TONSIL BISTOURY AND SCRAPER

In the case of a tonsillar abscess, several causes may prevent the escape of the pus after an incision has been made sufficiently deep to be consistent with safety. It is therefore in practice, writes Mr. LENNOX BROWNE, when the matter does not escape, to explore more deeply with a probe, and then to break down any tissue preventing the liberation of the pus. In every case it is desirable, according to modern views of surgery, to scrape out the abscess cavity.

The Tonsil Knife figured in the illustration is adapted to meet all these requirements (bistoury, probe, and sharp spoon, combined in a single instrument; and the surgeon has simply to reverse the instrument according to the purpose for which he requires it. Being made in one piece of metal it has the advantage of being easily and perfectly cleaned, and there being no joint or woodwork in its construction, there is no difficulty in rendering it completely aseptic.
