# MILITARY RULE IN LATIN AMERICA

## Functions, Consequences and Perspectives

*Edited by PHILIPPE C. SCHMITTER, University of Chicago*

A provocative collection of essays which enters previously unexamined areas and frequently challenges and forces revision of the conventional wisdom about the military in Latin America. This volume suggests that (in the editor's words) "there is growing evidence that the recipient military establishments have become increasingly less willing to accept the subordinate and limited strategic posture which has accompanied external support." Thus the political function and policy objectives of Latin American regimes is likely to undergo considerable change in the coming decade. Future perspectives considered in the volume also suggest the likelihood of increased violence and aggression between Latin American nations (rather than the present and past limitations to internal warfare).

# Ideology and Participation

by *DOUGLAS E. ASHFORD, Cornell University*

This volume is a look at the ways in which individual psychology and political structures must be congruent in order for a political system to maintain its legitimacy. The "need for consistency" is the basic variable examined in both citizens and institutions, but emotionality, symbolism, instrumentality and rationality are also discussed as they describe an individual's relationship to and participation in the political culture. The authoritarian situation of simultaneous low tolerance of inconsistency in both the government and the citizens is discussed and contrasted with the emphasis on adaptivity as a personal and social goal in "liberal" societies. The alternative possibilities of differing levels of inconsistency tolerance between citizens and government are of special interest to students of developing nations, since it is here that such incongruencies are most often found. Topics covered are: Ideology and Participation; Ideology: Independent or Dependent Factor? Apocalyptic Ideology and National Insecurity; Adaptive Ideology and Individual Cognition; Variation Among Institutional Norms; The Cultural Basis of a Working Ideology; Political Integration and a Working Ideology.

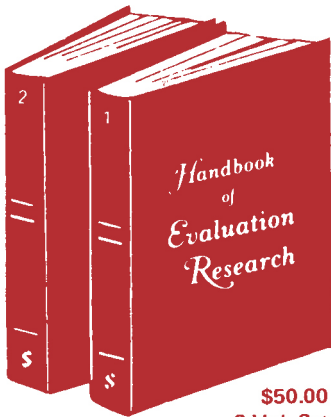
