Report of Registrar

Here in Galway, we are able to look at activities of the College during the past three months and to get much of it into better perspective. We have continued to be preoccupied with what must seem here to be the parochial problems of the two White Papers. Both of these have enormous impact for the practice of psychiatry within the United Kingdom but may well be a foretaste of things to come here or, at least an opportunity for important lessons concerning medical practice in general and the future of psychiatry in particular.

The Community Care paper on 'Caring for People' following the Griffiths Report has been the major concern. At the same time the Children Bill has passed through Parliament, changing into a very complex Act with implications on not just children but the lives of others in the family as well. To try and understand this, what has been referred to as a "supra-sectional" working group has been set up to build upon the recommendations of a smaller working party formed by the Child and Adolescent Section.

Audit appears to have almost universal application and it is attracting the interest of doctors all over the world. There have been a number of lively meetings as well as the continued activity of the Research Unit, the Research Committee and the Audit Working Party, the latter concentrating on fostering good practice in audit on the coal face or, as a more appropriate analogy here in Galway, at grass roots.

The College is coming to the end of its deliberations concerning 'The Practice of Psychiatry in a Multi-Ethnic Society'. There has been wide consultation, much discussion and surprising agreement on the essentials.

The many Sections and Divisions in the College continue to maintain a close relationship with the groups concerning the interests of patients and the parents of patients. Notably among the groups with whom we have been working are the National Schizophrenia Fellowship and the organisation called RESCARE, concerned with the residential care of people with mental handicaps.

We are delighted to continue our close relationship with the Republic of Ireland and the popularity of the choice of Galway as a place to meet can be seen in the very large numbers of people who will be attending the Dinner tonight.
