It organizes symposia at annual meetings which move around Europe and which have covered subjects like the Rights of Minority Groups, the Image of Science, the Study of the Human Genome, Population Migration, and the Search for Meaning in Contemporary Life. It has also established study groups, the first of which has published its findings in a book on 'Schooling in Contemporary European Society'. Other studies are in progress on Problems of Youth in a Changing Europe, Energy Forecasting, Higher Education, Teaching Science in Schools, Social Aspects of Science Policy, and the Idea of Progress.

It can be seen that the Academia Europaea has a wide perspective and this is reflected in this Review. The Academia is an independent organization based in London.
