1. Name, affiliation and contact details of the proposed Guest Editor;
2. Names of Contributors;
3. Proposed title and theme of Special Issue;
4. Background and Rationale for the proposal;
5. Detailed abstracts of all papers.

Please note that articles submitted to Special Issues will be peer reviewed as closely as those under regular submission to the journal. The process of selecting the successful proposal will involve both independent referees and the editorial team.
