#### **Recent modules and podcasts**

#### Module Physical activity interventions in severe mental illness

Psychiatrists can validate the benefits of regular physical activity and healthier lifestyle choices for patients. This module highlights current societal trends in physical activity; outlines the current Chief Medical Officers' (CMOs') weekly physical activity guidelines; assists you in understanding the common terminology used in the physical activity literature; provides the latest evidence base for physical activity interventions; and explores initiatives that have attempted practice implementation.
