I assume Julian Graffy continues to pick myopically at tiny threads in my Shostakovich book because he is incapable of taking in its complete canvas. Fair enough. Possibly, for him, revelation depends on a higher class of literature than mine. I'd recommend The Gulag Archipelago if I didn't expect him to reply that he'd read it with interest and found it rather contentious. Apart, though, from the three 'errors in the book's literary background' mentioned in his review (two of which are his, not mine), he has now repeated his wider caveat that my tone is rhetorical and my views exaggerated - which, considering he adduces no more evidence for this charge than he did the first time he made it, calls for a response. As it happens, I have no wish to bore Tempo readers with any more squabbling, so perhaps Mr Graffy would like to take this up with the Russian musicians and Western academics who have contacted me to express their warm approval of the tone and views he finds so worrying? As for his quaint theory that the truth about the Soviet system has long been a matter of universal agreement, only those who knew the background will be aware of how eccentric he is in maintaining this. I repeat: the record is there for anyone to read. For recent examples of disharmony at the highest scholarly level, Mr Graffy might care to weigh the 'sober assessments' of such controversialists as J. Arch Getty and Jerry Hough before venturing further pronouncements on the subject.
