Husserl Studies

Articles are invited for *Husserl Studies*, a new international journal, edited by J. N. Mohanty and Karl Schuhmann, and published by Martinus Nijhoff Publishers. The first issue is scheduled for the fall of 1983.

Husserl Studies intends to bring out the relevance of Husserl's phenomenology for the contemporary philosophical as well as the wider intellectual situation. It will encourage that interpretive and/or comparative works be solidly based on adequate textual researches into Husserl's writings.

In effect, the journal aims at being just the sort of forum for international Husserlian studies, both systematic and historical, that is now needed after many important texts from Husserl's Nachlass have been published. Intercultural and interdisciplinary work will also be encouraged.

The *Husserl Studies* will also contain critical reviews of current Husserl literature as well as of such other philosophical works which have a direct bearing on Husserl studies.

Occasionally, material either by Husserl himself or connected with the historical background of his thought may be published in the journal. There will also be a section devoted to news from the various phenomenological centres and societies and subscribers will, of course, be kept informed about the *Husserliana Gesamtausgabe* by the Husserl Archives at Louvain.

Articles in German should be accompanied by a short survey in English of approximately 400 words. They should be typewritten with wide margins on all sides. All texts, including footnotes should be double-spaced. Footnotes should be assembled on separate sheets. In matters of style contributors are requested to follow the format outlined in the MLA-stylesheet.

Conference on the Philosophy of Alan Donagan

A conference on The Philosophy of Alan Donagan, sponsored by the Illinois Philosophical Association, will be held at Illinois State University, November 4-5, 1983. Professor Donagan will be in attendance, and will respond to the papers and invited addresses included on the programme.

Interested philosophers are invited to submit papers bearing on philosophical topics with which Professor Donagan has worked, such as: the philosophy of history, historical explanation, studies in the history of philosophy, theory of action, theory of moral agency, and theory of morality. Papers should include some reference to his contributions, and should be submitted by July 15, 1983 to Professor Kenneth C. Kennard, Department of Philosophy, Illinois State University, Normal, Illinois 61761. It will be helpful if those attending to submit papers would inform Professor Kennard of that fact, and of their proposed topic. Papers should be short enough to be read in about thirty minutes (approximately ten typewritten pages). Those who submit papers will be informed of the decisions of the programme committee by September 1, 1983.

Le XVIIe Congrès Mondial de Philosophie aura lieu du 21 au 27 août au Palais des Congrès de Montréal. Déjà des délégués de plus de soixante pays ont annoncé leur participation. A Reminder

The XVIIth World Congress of Philosophy will be held August 21 to 27 in the Montreal Palais des Congrès. Delegates from more than sixty countries have already registered. Some 800 contributed papers have been submitted for thirty-five sections. Sixty round tables and special sessions, fifteen workshops, a dozen Poster Sessions, and four plenary sessions make up the programme. More than thirty philosophical societies will be holding their own meetings during the Congress. Various social and artistic activities are scheduled in the evenings on the Campus of the Université de Montréal where most of the out-of-town participants will be staying. You are cordially invited to attend this Congress which will bring to Canada philosophers from every continent.
