AMERICAN MEDICAL SOCIETY OF VIENNA

THE American Medical Society of Vienna recently opened its beautifully decorated and furnished new club rooms and library. It has taken over what remained of the assets of the former American Medical Association of Vienna, founded nearly 50 years ago, to which many British postgraduates belonged in happier days, but which faded out after Hitler's *anschluss* and disappeared during the last war. The new Society is now, as the Association did before, arranging postgraduate courses in the various branches of otolaryngology, as well as in other medical and surgical subjects, in association with the University of Vienna. It is situated only a stone's throw from the famous Allgemeines-krankenhaus, next door to the Café Beethoven, with which it has in fact a communicating door. Vienna appears to be recovering at last from the effects of the Second World War, the Opera House and St. Stephen's Cathedral have been rebuilt, special visas are no longer necessary nor letters censored, and visitors move freely without hindrance in all quarters of the city. Thursday, February 4th, 1954. Professor G. Hadfield. Co-carcinogenesis.

Thursday, March 4th, 1954. Mr. F. Williamson-Noble. Diseases of the orbit and its contents secondary to pathological conditions in the nose, sinuses and throat.

Thursday, April 1st, 1954. Mr. G. A. Mason. The diagnosis, treatment and prognosis of tumours of the lung.

Thursday, May 6th, 1954. Professor G. A. G. Mitchell. The sympathetic nervous system in relation to the throat, nose and ear.




