IN MEMORIAM

James R. Hooker

It is with the deepest regret that I have to inform you of the death of our colleague and friend, James R. Hooker.

James died accidentally during the early hours of Sunday morning, May 23, 1976, when a stove fire destroyed the farm house in Leelanau County where he was spending the weekend.

Dr. Hooker was well known for his work in African history, the Pan-African movement, and the rise of trade unionism in Central and Southern Africa. He recently published a biography of one of the first spokespersons of Pan-Africanism, Henry Sylvester Williams of Trinidad. Earlier he published a study of George Padmore, Black Revolutionary.

Dr. Hooker completed a doctorate in English History at Michigan State University in 1957 and joined the faculty at MSU in 1961. He was noted for his excellence in teaching and for his sustained commitment to the study of East, Central, and Southern Africa, including recent and contemporary developments.

There will be a Memorial Service in the University Chapel on Thursday, May 27, 1976. Tribute will be paid to Dr. Hooker by friends and former students.
