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Articles should start with an abstract of 150-250 words and a table of major headings; secondary and tertiary headings are not listed. Please indicate in text where illustrations and tables are to be inserted. Footnotes are discouraged; places where they are considered essential are marked in text with a superscript number, and the footnotes are listed at the end before the References.

Notes are short articles, generally of less than 2,000 words: they do not require an abstract or table of headings, but longer notes should end with a summary paragraph.

References, which must be restricted to essential ones only, are cited in text in the following forms: (Stirling 1981), (Stirling and Cleator 1981), (Stirling 1980; Cleator 1981, 1982), (Stirling and others 1981), reported by Stirling (1981, 1982). Full references are listed alphabetically at the end of the paper in the following forms:

References to privately printed or other unpublished reports and data are not accepted unless copies of the material are freely available from a named library or similar repository.

Style and spelling generally follow the *Oxford English Dictionary* and *Authors and Printers Dictionary* (Collins, F. H. 1973. London, Oxford University Press). Dates must be written in the form 1 January 1984 except in tables and figures, where they are abbreviated. Please use metric units (Imperial equivalents may be added in brackets where appropriate), and the 24 hour clock.

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Tables should be kept as simple as possible, and typed on separate sheets. They will normally be fitted across the page, only exceptionally lengthwise. Drawings, maps and diagrams must be of professional standard, with lettering and numbers pencilled-in clearly, preferably on a transparent overlay. Authors may be charged for re-drawing if an illustration is inadequate. They should if possible allow for reduction in width by about one third to fit the page; drawings 16-18 cm wide are ideal.

Photographs (black and white only) that add substantially to the article or note will be welcome. Glossy prints with high contrast, about one third oversize, generally reproduce well.
