The remaining sessions will be held at the Historical Library, Greenville, under the chairmanship of Harold F. Williamson, Northwestern University. The University of Delaware, in cooperation with the Eleutherian Mills-Hagley Foundation, will award two or more Hagley Museum Fellowships in April of 1964 for the academic years 1964-1966. Recipients of these grants take graduate work in history and related fields at the University of Delaware. In addition, they spend half of each week during the academic year training in museum work at the Hagley Museum and conducting research at the Eleutherian Mills Historical Library. They complete their work in two years, and graduate from the University of Delaware with a Master of Arts degree in American history. The program is of special interest to those who wish to study the development of American industry and technology.

Each fellowship carries an annual stipend of \$2,000 and is renewable upon satisfactory completion of the first year. Applications should be received by March 5, 1964. For further details, address the Chairman, Department of History, University of Delaware, Newark, Delaware.

The DeGolyer Foundation Library, housed at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, has announced recent additions to its Economic and Business History collection.

The papers, diaries, and notebooks of Samuel Matthews Vauclain (1856-1940) have been presented by the family to the library. Since

the industrialist was president of Baldwin Locomotive Works, these papers will supplement the existing DeGolyer Foundation collection of all existing manuscript records of the Baldwin Works in recording the nineteenth-century development of the locomotive.

Another recent DeGolyer acquisition, by gift, is a group of papers of John Insley Blair (1802-1899), railroad magnate, philanthropist, and
