Donald Grove Barnes is Professor of History at Western Reserve University. He is the author of *A History of the English Corn Laws, 1660 to 1846* and *George III and William Pitt, 1783 to 1806*.

# FATHERS OF THE VICTORIANS

by *Ford K. Brown*


