It is humbling to be part of and responsible for the production of the Journal in quite a different way than I was years ago as Book Review Editor. When Barney Reams unexpectedly resigned as Editor-in-Chief, the Board did not have a candidate ready to step in to replace him. Since Bridget Reischer from Harvard Law School already had accepted Larry Wenger's invitation to be Guest Editor for the Vienna proceedings, it seemed more like a breeze than a challenge to agree, in an emergency, to serve as Interim Editor for a year. Now I know better...

However, here it is, at long last, issue No. 1 of Volume 24, the product of a cooperative effort: Larry Wenger, IALL President, and Dick Danner, Chair of IJLI Advisory Committee on Publications, have exhibited unfailing interest, encouragement, and moral as well as practical support in the materialization of the Association-produced Journal. Credit goes last, but not least, of course, to the key player, Bridget Reischer, who, as Guest Editor as well as Program Chair and sine qua non of the Vienna Course, is responsible for the contents. The collecting of papers from different countries and continents, n.b., in various formats, has been a gargantuan task. When Bridget was appointed coordinator for the 14th Course in Vienna, it was with the knowledge and assurance that she would take advantage of the professional and personal contacts she acquired during her seven years as librarian at the Vienna International Centre Library. There is where she also developed some of the Austrian charm and zest with which she so successfully conducted the proceedings.

This is also to announce that Larry Wenger and Dick Danner currently are soliciting suggestions for the office of Editor of the Journal. In their own words, they are looking for a "world-class editor" to make the Journal a "premier publication for law librarians", for someone with an interest in bringing IJLI into the 21st century. The ideal candidate should be interested in expanding the membership base, have a broad net-work of professional contacts, and be open to discussing ideas such as: should the Journal be multilingual [i.e. English-French-German]? more scholarly, less scholarly? include also membership news? frequency: quarterly, or maybe biannually? should the Board consist of regional or national representatives?... Please convey your ideas and suggestions to any member of the Board.

Although late, it is hoped that this *Symposium Issue* will accurately reflect both the content and the spirit of the proceedings of the *14th Course* in the eyes of those who were present and be a valuable research and reference source for those who were not able to attend.
