# Social Policy and Society

## Guidelines for Contributors

1. All contributions and correspondence should be sent to SP & S Administrator, Department of Applied Social Science, University of Stirling, Stirling, UK FK9 4LA, email [spsadmin@stir.ac.uk](mailto:spsadmin@stir.ac.uk)
2. Articles should contain 5,000 words including footnotes. Word length **must** be stated.
3. Submission of an article is taken to imply that it has not previously been published, and has not been submitted for publication elsewhere. If an author is publishing a related article elsewhere, this fact should be stated, especially if this is with the *Journal of Social Policy*. Authors of articles published in the journal assign copyright to Cambridge University Press (with certain rights reserved) and you will receive a copyright assignment form for signature on acceptance of your paper. Contributors are responsible for obtaining permission to reproduce any material in which they do not own copyright, to be used in both print and electronic media, and for ensuring that the appropriate acknowledgements are included in their manuscript.
4. Contributions should be clearly typed on one side of A4 paper. All material should be typed double-spaced with generous margins. Contributors must send an electronic copy of the manuscript formatted in Microsoft Word by electronic mail **only**, and retain a copy of the typescript for correcting proofs. Following acceptance, contributors should submit their final version of the paper on computer disk (IBM compatible) together with the hard copy typescript, giving details of the word-processing software used (e.g. Microsoft Word) and operating system (e.g. Apple Mac OS or MS Windows). Disks will not be returned. The publisher reserves the right to typeset any article by conventional means if the author's disk proves unsatisfactory.
5. All contributions should be accompanied by an abstract of no more than one hundred words, together with a detachable title page providing information about the word length, the position/s held by the author/s, full correspondence and email addresses and full details of any acknowledgements.
6. Contributions should conform exactly to the *Social Policy and Society* style and authors should check the format of their own contribution with that of a recent issue of the journal (or seek advice from the Managing Editor and/or Guest Editor as appropriate) paying particular attention to references and tables.
7. Gender-neutral language should be used throughout. The Harvard (author/date) system should be used and reference to page numbers in the text should be shown as follows: Maltby, 2002:1 and not Maltby, 2002, p. 1. References to websites should contain the full URL and date the site was accessed (i.e. <http://www.social-policy.com>, 1/Jan/03).
8. Such notes as are essential, should be referred to in numerical order throughout the text and the numbers shown as superscript. Notes and bibliographical references should be typed (double-spaced) as separate sections at the end of the article.
9. Tables and figures should be clearly laid out and designed to fit onto a page 18 cm × 12 cm. Vertical lines between columns should be omitted, and horizontal lines limited to the top and bottom of the table, with an additional one below the column headings. Totals and percentages should be labelled, and units identified.
10. First proofs may be read and corrected by contributors provided that they can give the Managing Editor an address through which they can be reached without delay and can guarantee to return the corrected proofs by airmail where appropriate, within seven days of receiving them. Typographical or factual errors **only** may be changed at proof stage. The publisher reserves the right to charge authors for corrections of non-typographical errors.
11. Paper offprints are not automatically supplied to authors. Upon publication the corresponding author will receive a pdf of their article. Paper offprints can be purchased by using the form supplied at proof stage.
