

## Submission of Articles and Comment

The *Ecclesiastical Law Journal* covers all aspects of ecclesiastical law, with a particular emphasis on the legal regulation of the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion. Its range of coverage also includes comparative studies of the laws of other faiths and of the interface between law and religion in United Kingdom jurisprudence and worldwide.
