Instructions for Authors

Aims and Scope

The purpose of the *Canadian Journal of Philosophy* is the publication of international philosophical work of high quality, in English or French, in any field of philosophy. All submissions are given blind editorial review. As many submissions as possible are sent to external referees, with a response to authors within six months of submission. When submissions are not sent for external refereeing, RCJP endeavours to respond to authors within three months.

Preparing and submitting your manuscript

Before preparing your submission, please visit the *Canadian Journal of Philosophy* homepage at <http://www.tandfonline.com/rcjp> for full instructions for authors.

Papers for consideration should be submitted to the Editor, David Hunter, at: cjp@philosophy.ryerson.ca. Authors are encouraged to submit manuscripts electronically. Electronic submissions should be sent as email attachments using a standard program such as MS Word.

Manuscripts should be prepared for blind review, which means they should contain no self-identifying references in either text or footnotes. An abstract of 150 to 250 words should also be included.

Submitted manuscripts are subject to peer review at the discretion of the Editorial Office. In order to maintain anonymity during any refereeing process, authors are requested to refrain from, or keep to a minimum, self-referencing.
