In attempting to strike this balance, a primary goal of the journal is to encourage work which makes complex language data accessible to those unfamiliar with the language area being studied, and work which makes complex theoretical positions more accessible to those working outside the theoretical framework under review.

The journal is structured to include:

- theoretically oriented work on the syntax, semantics, phonology and the lexicon of natural language;
- interdisciplinary contributions written with theoretical linguists in mind;
- surveys of recent theoretical developments which facilitate accessibility for a graduate student readership;
- reactions/replies to recent papers;
- brief notes, comments or observations concerning languages or theoretical points;
- letters to the editors;
- book reviews of important linguistics titles;
- special topic issues.

For over two decades Jan Aarts has been actively involved in corpus linguistic research. He was the instigator of a large number of projects, and he was responsible for what has become known as "the Nijmegen approach" to corpus linguistics. It is thanks to him that words like TOSCA and LDB have become household names in the corpus linguistic community.

The present volume has been collected in his honour. The contributions in it cover a wide range of topics in the field of corpus linguistic research, especially those in which Jan Aarts takes a keen interest: corpus encoding and tagging, parsing and databases, and the linguistic exploration of corpus data. The contributions in this volume discuss work done in this field outside Nijmegen, for the obvious reason that we do not wish to present him with a report on work in which he is himself involved.



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Policy *Phonology* is concerned with all aspects of phonology and related disciplines. Each volume contains two issues, published in April and October. From time to time, one of the issues will be devoted to one or more themes. The editors encourage the submission of papers on proposed themes as well as on other topics relevant to the interests of *Phonology*. In addition, they welcome offers to act as guest editor for particular themes. The normal language of publication is English. Contributors intending to submit a manuscript in another language should first contact the editors.

Volume 12 (1995) will be non-thematic.
