Prolegomena to Homer, 1795

F. A. Wolf

Translated with introduction and notes by *Anthony Grafton, Glenn W. Most, and James E. G. Zetzel*

This is the first translation into English of Friedrich August Wolf's *Prolegomena ad Homerum*, generally acknowledged as the first modern work of classical scholarship and a founding text in modern historical criticism. First published in 1795, the *Prolegomena* remains significant and influential. This edition is intended to contribute to the history of scholarship and to make Wolf accessible to modern readers. The introduction places Wolf in the context of eighteenth-century scholarship and culture. Editorial notes, corrections of Wolf's references, a biographical index, and a critical bibliography are included. \$42.00

Sovereignty and Coinage in Classical Greece

Thomas R. Martin

This book examines the common assumption that coins were produced in classical Greece to serve as symbols of the political sovereignty of the state, much like flags of modern nations. Since the beginning of modern numismatics studies, scholars have used this assumption to establish the chronology of numerous Greek coinages and, in turn, to make hypotheses about important historical events, especially the intervention in Greek affairs of Philip II, Alexander the Great, and their early successors. Thomas Martin challenges the standard opinion, refuting the notion that a conquered state automatically lost its "right of coinage" and establishing that the minting of classical Greek coinage was primarily motivated by economic concerns. Excavations at Sarāḫane in Istanbul

Volume 1

R. M. Harrison

With contributions by *M. V. Gill, M. Hendy, S. J. Hill, D. Brothwell, and K. Kosswig*

This work is the first volume of two that will be the full report of major excavations carried out by Dumbarton Oaks and the Istanbul Archaeological Museum at Sarāḫane in the heart of ancient Constantinople. The main objective of the excavations, which extended over six seasons, was the palace-church of St. Polyeuktos, erected by the Byzantine princess Anicia Juliana in 524–527 and hitherto known only from historical sources. Excavation revealed a church that was for a time the largest and most sumptuous in the city and of extraordinary importance both architecturally and for its exotic decoration. (It now appears that it was modeled on biblical descriptions of Solomon's Temple at Jerusalem.) This volume includes discussion of excavation and stratigraphy; catalogs of sculpture, revetment, mosaic, small finds and other materials; and general treatment of architecture, sculpture, and history of the site.

Demography and Democracy



The author argues the following theses:

1. We must distinguish between the total number of Athenian citizens and the total number of Athenian citizens living in Attica.
2. A citizen population is a legal concept, and not a natural demographic entity.
3. In fourth-century Athens life expectancy was ca. 25 years and the growth rate did not exceed 1/2%.
4. In the fourth century the number of citizens living in Attica was doomed to be stationary or perhaps even declining due to the slow natural population growth combined with constant emigration which was not balanced by immigration.
5. Even a well informed Athenian was probably ignorant of the total number of citizens.
6. At least some 25% of all males between 18 and 60 were exempted from military service.
7. Whenever a fleet was launched a demographically significant number of citizens was sent out.
8. The Athenian war effort in 323-22 points to a minimum of 30,000 citizens living in Attica.
9. The population census conducted by Demetrios of Phaleron was an *exetasmos*, i.e. a military review of citizens (and metics?) between 18 and 60 who were fit for military service.
10. The running of the council of five hundred required a minimum of 25,000 citizens, and ca. 30,000 is a more realistic estimate.
11. The *ephebeia* was open to all Athenians, but only some 60% of a year class (i.e. ca 500 men) were in fact trained as ephebes.
