Continuing medical education

Continuing medical education (CME), or continuing professional development, will now receive special attention in the *Psychiatric Bulletin* (Kerr, 1994). A report from the Special Committee (of Council) on CME examining consultant psychiatrists' experiences and opinions on CME has already been published (Sensky, 1994). Two further aspects of the work of the Committee are now reported.

College position on CME

The College is responsible for the provision of CME in psychiatry. The Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists recently published criteria for mandatory CME for accreditation of its members and fellows. Some form of accreditation seems inevitable and, to avoid a system being imposed from outside, the College is working towards the introduction of a scheme, which will involve wide consultation with the membership.

A new journal, Advances in Psychiatric Treatment, under the editorship of Professor Andrew Sims, is planned. Also, a CME Department has been formed within the College and will be actively involved in the provision of courses, seminars and workshops.

CME in the 'Bulletin'

CME matters will appear regularly in the *Bulletin* and include reports of medico-political interest from the Special Committee, the Conference of Colleges, Government Offices, and purchasers and providers. Reports of successful CME events which might act as catalysts for others' activities will be encouraged.

This statement therefore serves as a call for papers.
